#### **Need Assessment**

Asthma health outcomes are some of the most disparate among chronic diseases. African American (AA) and Puerto Rican populations have the highest persistent prevalence with the greatest severity and poorest control (1) AA and Puerto Rican children have poorer responses to medication and are four times more likely to die than white children. African Americans in general are three times more likely to die and five times more likely to visit the hospital. Black women have the highest rate of death secondary to asthma; These disparities have not significantly changed in the last 15-20 years. The multifactorial nature of the disease, social determinants, and inadequate representation in clinical therapeutic trials contributes to disparate asthma outcomes. Asthma treatment in primary care settings in collaboration with subspecialists can facilitate a best care model. Physician education on new best practice paradigms will optimize outcome equity.

#### **Practice Gap**

Asthma health disparities persist despite expert clinical guidelines. Present best practices for asthma care give inadequate emphasis on economic, educational, and environmental barriers. The integration of clinical guidelines with attention to social determinants can improve patient outcomes and achieve greater health equity.

Despite growing evidence that the provision of pediatric palliative care reduces suffering and improves the quality of life for children and families navigating complex chronic illness, barriers to referral for consultation and utilization continue to exist for providers as well as patients. Due to longstanding structural and systemic barriers these inequities are exacerbated for marginalized communities. The impact of these disparities can be seen in every sector of society and in every disease category. For pediatric patients, the impact of these adverse outcomes extends from patient to caregiver, to siblings resulting in generational harm. This dynamic, diverse, and interactive panel of palliative care experts will review essential constructs of palliative care, summarize barriers to utilization of palliative care consultation, and address strategies for reducing inequities in palliative care for pediatric patients of color.

During this session, participants will learn about key knowledge gaps that can impact individuals living with sickle cell disease (SCD) and the community. Practitioners will begin to learn about common concerns that sickle cell patients may have about new therapies and the evidence of their efficacy and safety. Additionally, participants will learn the current landscape of sickle cell therapeutics–access and the patient voice. Participants will hear from a practicing clinician and clinician scientist about managing sickle cell and the balance of selecting the appropriate disease modifying medications for each patient, with multiple new FDA approved therapies for this disease. Participants will learn about different community-based organizations (CBOs) that support sickle cell patients and families and how to connect to specialized centers of excellence. Participants will learn about how to connect to improve the quality of life, enhance cultural competency, care for sickle cell patients, and compose their plan to collaborate with subspecialists, community groups, or their local children's hospital in support of sickle cell patients and their families in their local area.

Following participation in this symposium, attendees should be able to: 1) identify and summarize the key gaps that exist in access to sickle cell therapeutics and gene therapies; 2) discuss the role of disease modifying therapies in sickle cell patients in the setting of available gene therapies; and 3) present an advocacy action plan to collaborate with subspecialists and community-based organizations (CBOs)

a combined session with the Emergency Medicine & Psychiatry Sections Suicide is a significant public health concern, particularly among pediatric populations, with disparities in risk factors and access to mental health services playing a crucial role. This session focuses on the critical importance of addressing suicide prevention in health care settings for pediatric populations. Individuals experiencing suicidal ideation and behaviors are slipping through the cracks in our health and behavioral health systems. These gaps in care contribute to suicide being the second leading cause of death among people aged 10-24 in the United States, with rates steadily rising over the decades. According to a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) report, mental healthrelated emergency department (ED) visits for suicide attempts among adolescents aged 12–17 increased by 31% in early 2021 compared to the same period in 2019 (American Academy of Pediatrics, 2023).

Although systems may have access to best practices in suicide care, not all providers are adequately trained to implement these practices, nor do systems consistently monitor adherence to them. This contributes to adverse events. This session will highlight tools, interventions, and best practices that can reduce or close gaps in patient care and enhance patient safety.

At the conclusion of this educational session, attendees should be able to: 1) understand the importance of addressing equity in suicide prevention efforts among pediatric populations; 2) identify key disparities related to suicide risk factors, access to mental health services, and cultural considerations that impact pediatric suicide rates; and 3) understand and implement evidence-based strategies for promoting suicide prevention specifically tailored to pediatric populations.

#### 8:00 – 10:00 Healthcare Among Youth in the U.S. Juvenile Legal System: Challenges and Opportunities

In 2021, approximately 25,000 youth were detained or committed in a U.S. detention center, with a disproportionate number of minoritized (Black Latinx, and Native American [64%], and male (86%) \*86 %children. Despite the declining rates of youth arrest and incarceration, healthcare disparities for youth in custody persist at alarming rates. Two-thirds of youth in detention have physical and mental health needs and 46% have at least one diagnosed medical condition, compared to 19% of youth in the general population. Varying quality of care provision in facilities, limited healthcare access in the community, and related social determinants of health contribute to the disparities – some of which can be reduced by pediatrician engagement on the care of youth in custody. This session will highlight the health status of youth involved in the U.S. juvenile legal system, discuss available health services within this system, and explore essential qualities for effective engagement with this population. The session will offer perspectives from the lived experiences of youth in detention and emphasize the essential role of pediatric providers in ensuring comprehensive care for children re-entering their communities post-detention.
